#### **Address from Director, NICPR**

I feel delighted to announce the issuance of the second volume of the half-yearly newsletter of the National Institute of Cancer Prevention and Research (ICMR-NICPR) for the year 2022.

NICPR has been working continuously towards the goal of cancer prevention. The health promotion clinic at NICPR has been running full-fledged and patients are being screened for common cancers. NICPR scientists have been awarded several new research projects and are working enthusiastically towards their goals.

# Cervavac: an indigenous vaccine for prevention of cervical cancer – facts, challenges, and way forward

As per WHO (World Health Organization) estimates, India accounts for a fifth of the global cervical cancer cases in the world. The GLOBOCAN 2020 data has rated cervical cancer as the third most common cancer and the second most common cause of cancer-related deaths in India. Certain areas in India e.g., the Papum Pare district in Arunachal Pradesh have the highest incidence rate (27.7 per 100000) of cervical cancer across Asia. As per ICMR and NCDIR report 2021, Papum Pare and Aizwal (Mizoram) districts have the highest incidence of all new cancer cases in the country among females and males



Nearly 70% of cervical cancer cases are caused due to persistent infection with high-risk strains of Human papillomavirus (HPV) in sexually active women. This leads to erratic proliferation of the healthy cervix cells resulting in tumor development. This happens due to interactions between viral proteins (E6/E7) and host oncogenes (p53). HPV has a significant role to play in the pathogenesis of cervical cancer, although not all HPV-positive cases develop cancer. Important risk factors include multiple sexual partners, sexual activity at a younger age, smoking, compromised immune system, and pre-existing urinary tract infections and HIV co-infection.

The mortality rate of cervical cancer is high due to its late detection. It can be prevented if girls between age of 9 to 14 years are immunized against HPV. As of now, two vaccines namely Gardasil (from Merck) and Cervarix (from GSK) are available in India. The first one is a quadrivalent vaccine while the latter one is a bivalent vaccine. Both of these are highly effective, but their high costs have been a major obstacle to their affordability. Further, the non-inclusion of these vaccines in the universal immunization program (UIP) has prevented their large-scale introduction.

Recently, India is preparing to launch an indigenous quadrivalent vaccine (against HPV types 6, 11, 16 & 18). This indigenous vaccine "Cervavac" has been developed through combined efforts of the Serum Institute of India (SII) and DBT-BIRAC. It has already received the Drugs Controller General of India's (DGCI) approval for market authorization. Two doses of this vaccine given 6 months apart have been shown to generate adequate immunity that can last up to 7 years and boosters may not be required. In experimental studies, Cervavac has shown robust antibody response, and, it will be significantly cheaper as compared to available vaccines. The government is exploring making the vaccine available in the Universal Immunization Program.

Despite the ongoing advances in cervical cancer prevention research, an important aspect that needs much attention is to increase awareness about cervical cancer and its vaccine in the population. The major factors responsible for poor screening coverage in India include ignorance regarding cervical cancer, the stigma associated with the gynecological examination and the scarcity of healthcare resources, especially in rural settings. Participation of ASHA workers and ANMs in creating awareness for screening and introduction of the vaccine in UIP are some of the measures that need immediate attention to prevent cervical cancer and to address the WHO's global call for action to eliminate cervical cancer. These measures are in sync with the WHO's call that focuses on three goals: vaccination, screening, and treatment.

Further, India has also committed to the World Health Assembly's resolution for eliminating cervical cancer. As per this resolution, by 2030, the countries should achieve a target of 90% HPV vaccination by 15 years of age, 70% of women to be screened using a high-performance test by age 35, and again by 45 years of age, 90% of women identified with the cervical disease receive treatment, and 90% of women with invasive cancer are effectively managed. India still has a long way to go and it is pertinent that we act fast in a comprehensive manner.




# कैंसर जागरूकता और रोकथाम में महत्वपूर्ण दिन की प्रभाविकता


21 वीं सदी में कैंसर के प्रति जागरूकता बहुत महत्वपूर्ण हो गई है। इसके साथ ही कैंसर की समझ, निदान, और उपचार में भी प्रगित हुई हैं जो की इस कारक रोग को हराने में काफी हद तक अपना योगदान देते हैं। प्रत्येक वर्ष नए कैंसर मामलों की संख्या में लगातार वृद्धि हुई है। हालांकि, विश्व स्वास्थ्य संगठन के अनुसार, कैंसर से होने वाली 40% मौतों को रोका जा सकता है। लेकिन इसके लिए आवश्यकता है कैंसर की बीमारी के प्रति जागरूकता जिसमें महत्वपूर्ण दिवस एवं माह विशेष भूमिका निभाते है।

वैश्विक व राष्ट्रीय दिवस स्वास्थ्य के मुद्दों के बारे में जागरूकता और समझ बढ़ाने और स्थानीय समुदाय से लेकर अंतर्राष्ट्रीय मंच तक कार्रवाई के लिए समर्थन जुटाने की बड़ी क्षमता प्रदान करते हैं। विशिष्ट स्वास्थ्य मुद्दों या स्थितियों से संबंधित पूरे वर्ष में कई विश्व व राष्ट्रीय दिवस मनाए जाते हैं। दुनिया में महत्वपूर्ण तिथियां लोगों में जागरूकता एवं संबंधित विषयों पर सभी का ध्यान केंद्रित करती है।








#### 6th October 2022


# 4th November 2022: Strategic Review Meeting of Scientists with Director General, ICMR




#### December 2022



A series of cervical and breast cancer screening and awareness camps were organized for the female prisoners at the District jail, Dasna, Ghaziabad during July – December 2022. A Talk about the early signs and symptoms of cervical and breast cancer and the importance of early cancer screening was given. A total of 40 female prison inmates were screened during this period.





# **National Tobacco Testing Laboratory**

The National Tobacco Testing Laboratory (NTTL) at NICPR has been established by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India for the purpose of Tobacco Research and Testing. The lab has participated in WHO TobLabNet method validation for nicotine, moisture and pH analysis of reference SLT samples for developing SOPs. Now, the SOPs have been published by WHO TobLabNet. The lab received samples from various government agencies such as Chief Medical Officer UP, Deputy Commissioner of Customs W.B., Inland Container Depot U.K., Superintendent of Police, Konkan Railway, DGGI Patna and Drug Control Officer Rajasthan for tobacco product analysis. The lab has analysed approximately 119 smoke & smokeless tobacco samples and performed nearly 400 tests in the duration of July-December, 2022 (~1200 test in triplicate).




